AP Government and Politics

Gentlemen,

Welcome to AP Government and Politics. As we head into the summer, I wanted to give you an indication about what you are heading into. The goal in this course will be to prepare you to take the AP exam in May. We will cover the five sections that make up the test and will utilize the Multiple Choice and Free Response Essay format throughout the year.

In many respects, you will teach yourself the material. The readings for the class can be found in a free, online text found at <u>www.ushistory.org/gov/index.asp</u>. I will assign questions for each chapter that you will be responsible for. The class will be conducted using Cold Calling (me calling randomly on students to answer questions about the day's readings) and the Socratic Method (a teaching technique in which questions are asked continually until either the student gives the wrong answer or reasoning, or the teacher is satisfied with the student's response). It will be imperative that you do the readings and answer the questions I provide. Your verbal responses will be graded on a scale of 1 to 4 (with 4 being the highest) and this aspect of the class will make up 50% of your grade (the other 50% will be written work and tests). If this is not something you feel you can or want to do, please visit with your Guidance Counselor and drop the course. This is an AP class and will be taught at ahigh level.

An attachment with the questions for Chapters 1 and 2 in the online text is included in this email. This will be due on the first day of class for the Cold Calling segment.
